Preventing spread of injection

There are general principles anyone can follow to help prevent the spread of respiratory viruses, including:

- washing your hands often with soap and water, or use alcohol sanitiser if handwashing facilities are not available. This is particularly important after taking public transport
- covering your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throwing the tissue in a bin. See <u>Catch it</u>, <u>Bin it</u>, <u>Kill it</u>
- people who geel unwell should stay at home and should not attend work or any education or childcare setting

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- use an alcohol-based hand sanitiser that contains at least 60% alcohol is soap and water are not available
- avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands
- avoid close contact with people who are unwell
- · clean and disingect prequently touched objects and surfaces
- if you are worried about your symptoms or those of a child or colleague, please call NHS III. Do not go directly to your GP or other healthcare environment
