- Common Exception Word Slam

Ask your adult to choose a small number of common exception words from the lists below (4-6) and practise reading these with them. Ask your adult to write them out clearly on pieces of paper and lay them out in a row. When your adult calls out a tricky word, beat them to it by 'slamming' the correct word with your hand.


Can you find the chosen number from this square using the clues below?

- The Past

Lots of things in life can change very quickly. A great way to find out about the past is to ask people about their lives and compare this to our own.

Think of a family member who is older than you can create a list of questions that you would like to ask them about their life growing up. Record these questions in a letter or email, or ask them over the phone.

Record what you find out through drawing pictures or writing facts. Can you compare how your life growing up is different to theirs?

- Marble Run

Use a marble or a small ball to make a marble run inside or outside. You could use a range of materials from inside your home, like kitchen roll tubes or

cardboard boxes. How long can you keep the marble rolling for? Time yourself and record your best time in your learning journal. What was successful about your marble run? What did you have to change to make it better?
