English

Reading LO Summarise the main ideas drawn from more than one paragraph and identify key details that support the main ideas. Use references and/or quotations from the text to support arguments.

Writing LO Write effectively for a range of purposes and audiences, selecting language that shows good awareness of the reader.

This week in English sessions we will be focusing on reading, understanding and summarising the main points from a piece of text.

Choose a passage in a non-fiction book. If you don't have a non-fiction book you could look up something on the internet you are interested in or chose a factual article from a magazine or newspaper.

For handwriting practice, copy out the page onto a sheet of lined paper in your best cursive script.

Read the whole article and then write a one paragraph summary. Ensure you cover all the main points of the article and major facts. Remember a summary should only be short and to the point.

In writing we will be writing a book review of either 'You Are Awesome 'or 'Go Big' (the books we have been looking at for our transition project). If you haven't read these books you can do a review on any book you have recently read. Think carefully about what you liked/disliked about the book, the style the author has used and whether you would recommend it to a friend.

We will also be writing a letter to the author to accompany the review, telling them what we have learnt from the project, then sending them off as the final part of the transition project.

Even if you have not reviewed the same books as us, you could also write a letter to the author of your chosen book. Most authors will respond to your letters, use the address of the publishing house from the inside front cover of the book.
